WILLIAMSBURG, Va. (Nov. 18, 2022) – Colonial Williamsburg invites woodworking enthusiasts, craftspeople and scholars to delve into the world of ornamentation with a special 25th anniversary edition of the annual [Working Wood in the 18th Century Conference](#), Jan. 26 – 29, 2023. Offered both virtually and in-person, this year's conference will explore the techniques, people, and stories behind ornamentation in woodwork. Guest presenters include professor and author Brock Jobe, professional woodcarver Mary May, nationally recognized furniture maker Frank Strazza, and author and woodworker Jerome Bias. Additional

“Much like today, ornament is what really gives a piece of 18th-century woodwork its personality,” said Bill Pavlak, master cabinetmaker at The Colonial Williamsburg Foundation, “Details like inlay or carving provide a great deal of insight into the material culture of the era by teaching us not only about the tools and techniques of the time, but also about what the people using and creating these pieces valued and enjoyed.”

Presentation highlights include:

- Opening Keynote by professor and author **Brock Jobe** on 18th-century cabinet shops in London, Boston & Philadelphia, generously sponsored by the *Early American Industries Association*.
- Professional woodcarver **Mary May** demonstrating techniques using the carved details on the pediment of a Philadelphia high chest, as well as delivering the banquet keynote address on Saturday evening
- Furniture maker **Frank Strazza** on 18th-century marquetry.
- Author and woodworker **Jerome Bias** exploring furniture design by Thomas Day, an antebellum free black man who is often regarded as the most successful cabinetmaker in North Carolina; generously underwritten by *Society of American Period Furniture Makers*.
- Colonial Williamsburg’s Anthony Hay Shop Cabinetmakers Bill Pavlak (Master Cabinetmaker) and John Peeler (Apprentice Cabinetmaker) on sculpting a Rhode Island bureau table.
- Brian Weldy, journeyman-supervisor joiner at The Colonial Williamsburg Joiner Shop, on fluted pilasters, generously underwritten by *North Bennet Street School*.
- Peter Hudson, apprentice joiner at The Colonial Williamsburg Joiner Shop, on reconstructing a paneled portico.
- Furniture Conservator at The Colonial Williamsburg Foundation Chris Swan on japanning.
- Colonial Williamsburg Apprentice Carpenter Harold Caldwell on African-inspired carvings.
- Tara Chicirda, curator of furniture at The Colonial Williamsburg Foundation, on the inlay and marquetry of a southwest Virginia maker.

[Guest and companion programs](#) are available for specific activities and should be registered for in advance.

In-person registration is \$395 per person and includes presentations, evening receptions, conference dinner, continental breakfasts, and coffee breaks. Virtual-only registration is \$150 per person and includes access to all general session presentations through the conference streaming platform. Both in-person and virtual-only registration include a seven-day ticket voucher to Colonial Williamsburg’s Art Museums and Historic Area, valid for redemption through Dec. 31, 2023. Registration and payment in full are required by Jan. 1, 2023.
